PLAINFIELD, N. J., July 14.—The trouble in Dunellen over the public-school question has reached such a point that the Trustees have been asked to resign in a body in order that a thorough reorganization may be effected. The citizens are greatly dissatisfied with the school management, and assert that the pupils do not receive nearly as good an education as they ought. They desire that grades be established so that graduates may at once enter college, and they demand that a more competent staff of instructors be secured. Messrs. Stinson, Richter, Haffner, Churchill, and Munson have been appointed to submit their grievances to the County Superintendent.

If the public school cannot be perfected, the citizens declare they will build a private college

preparatory school of their own.
