

LEWISTON, Me., June 15.—The police authorities here have been unable to locate any young woman by the name of Laura Madden, mentioned in a New York dispatch as having attempted suicide in that city, and giving her address as "Auburn Street, Lewiston, Me." Neither the name Madden nor Rugby is in the Lewiston Directory, and there is no Auburn Street in this city.

TOWN OF LINCOLN TO BE SOLD.

Built by a Syndicate, It Has Not Been a Paying Investment.

The village of Lincoln, N. J., will be sold at auction on July 10, by Frederick C. Wolbert of Jersey City. The village is on the Lehigh Valley and the Jersey Central Railroads, between Dunnellen and Bound Brook. It is the only town in New Jersey which has tried woman suffrage.

The village was planned by a syndicate, which macadamized the streets and built a trolley line. It has a church and school house. The town has not been a paying venture, and it is to be sold by order of the Court of Chancery, so that there may be a winding up of the affairs of the syndicate by the receiver, James P. Northrop of Jersey City.
