

## NEW-JERSEY.

A party of gentlemen, including several members of the Press, yesterday made an excursion trip over the Central Railroad of New-Jersey as far as Dunellen, near Plainfield. This is considered one of the most beautiful spots on the whole line of the road, and is fast growing into a beautiful suburban town. It is twenty-seven miles from the City, and the commutation fare is only thirty cents each way, the trip taking about one hour. The excursionists enjoyed a drive about the vicinity of Dunellen, visiting the top of Washington Rock, from whence there is a clear view down to Sandy Hook.

Some time ago a woman named Mrs. MARDEN endeavored to remove a corn from her toe, and in so doing cut rather deeply, and mortification ensued. The consequence was that the member had to be amputated. The stump never thoroughly healed, however, and the infection gradually invaded her leg, and on Friday that member was amputated; but the patient was unable to endure the operation, and died in a short time.

There is a genuine case of that peculiar and, in this country almost unknown disease, leprosy, at the Essex County Almshouse. The unfortunate victim is a butcher named ROBERT S. BROWN. He has been troubled for years with an eruptive disease, which has lately proven worse, and has now developed into leprosy. The case is exciting considerable interest among medical men.

Yesterday afternoon, as JAMES REILLY, a boy, was crossing the New-Jersey Railroad track at the Warren-street crossing, Jersey City, he was struck by a locomotive and was severely cut in the head. He was conveyed to the City Hospital. He gave his place of abode as No. 36 Crosby-street, New-York.

Mrs. CHARLOTTE HELLMAN was found drowned in a cistern in her kitchen, in Elizabeth, yesterday morning. She was subject to fits of apoplexy, and it is supposed that in stooping over the water she was attacked by the disease, and fell in.

A little child, while riding upon the step of an ice wagon, at Newark, was thrown against the hook at the side of the wagon, and being caught by the fleshy part of the arm was drawn in that way some distance before the flesh gave way.

The boat crew of the Oneida Club at Jersey City yesterday rowed their six-oared barge to Newark, where they remain until Monday, going then to Dundee Lake to take part in the Fourth of July regatta at that place.
